A Special Kitten Meets His Perfect Match

When Leo arrived at IMHS from an overcrowded shelter that could no longer keep him, we knew we had a special case on our hands. This sweet five-month-old brown tabby hobbled: his short legs were disproportionate to his body, causing a crooked gait. His tail was short with a "corkscrew" curve to the right. Unsure as to the cause of his condition and what his adoptive care may require, the IMHS medical team arranged for Leo to be examined at Lone Rock Veterinary Hospital. With a better understanding of his needs, we knew this lively kitten's outgoing personality would help him endear himself to a potential adopter as quickly as he had become a staff favorite.

The following week, Leo's diagnostic tests from the specialist revealed that his condition was most likely congenital, meaning that he was born with skeletal defects causing his legs and tail to be deformed. Despite his quirky physical appearance, Leo did not otherwise appear

The IMHS staff found him a comfortable front-and-center spot in the adoption room, and soon Leo was set up in a high profile cage location so shelter visitors and volunteers could get to know him. From his first day on the cat adoption floor, Leo made it abundantly clear to everyone he met that he was no ordinary

kitten, to be sure! This little fellow could really turn on the charm. Unaware that his malformed frame was anything unusual, Leo's affectionate, gregarious personality shined as he reached out to grab anyone passing his cage, demanding to be noticed.

Declawing Facts & Alternatives

Declawing is bone amputation surgery designed to remove the tip of the cat's toe at the first joint, to prevent destructive scratching.

The process can cause pain and in some cases, lead to complications throughout a cat's life.

Some people have noted cats having problems using litter boxes following declawing. In some cases, cat guardians have reported personality changes in their animals following claw amputation.

Effective alternatives to declawing include providing a scratching post for the cat, nail-trimming, and application of plastic claw "caps" to prevent destructive scratching. Claw caps are easy to apply and come in different sizes and fun colors, and can be purchased in most pet supply stores.

Want to train your cat to scratch on a cat post or special scratch mat? Sprinkle catnip at the location, and your cat will do the rest!

To discourage your kitty from scratching the furniture, temporarily run some strips of double-stick tape in places you don't want her to scratch. Cats are fast learners, and they don't like the sticky feel of the tape on their paws.



When IMHS was called to the rescue by local animal control officers to accept a pair of unclaimed stray border collie mixes, the shelter team got busy preparing a comfortable spot for the new arrivals. On first meeting the unneutered teenage dogs, dubbed Wally and Wilbur, the IMHS staff was puzzled as to how two such young, sweet dogs could go unclaimed after waiting five full days at the animal control shelter for a guardian who never came.

In getting to know Wally and Wilbur, the whole IMHS team fell in love right way—what a delight these two smart boys proved to be! Although they were initially frightened and their black-and-white coats were muddy and caked with grime, it was easy to see that these young fellows, once cleaned up, would make wonderful companions to some lucky adopters. Right away Wally and Wilbur were bathed, and it was arranged for them to be neutered, microchipped, and receive full medical treatment by the IMHS volunteer veterinary staff so they could be placed up for adoption.

Knowing how important it is for pups and teenage dogs, in particular, to transition quickly from the shelter into a home environment where they can begin forming a solid bond with their new family and training can be optimized, the IMHS team was pleased to bid farewell to Wally and see him ride away with a loving family to start his new life.

However, sweet Wilbur, with his mostly white coat and black freckles, lingered at IMHS as weeks went by, waiting to be noticed by that perfect someone. With his offbeat good looks and easy-going temperament, it was a mystery to the shelter's staff and volunteers how darling

The IMHS dog enrichment volunteers devoted special care to training Wilbur to walk better on a leash, and provided him with socialization and "romp time" in doggie play groups each day to keep him busy. During this time, Wilbur became a very special favorite of the volunteer dog-walkers and enrichment team, and as each day went by it was hoped that he'd meet an active family to take him home.

Five weeks later, when Mark and Kathy visited IMHS looking for the perfect companion for their border collie Sky, who had been adopted from IMHS in 2010, Wilbur's luck took a turn for the better. For Mark and Kathy, the search for Sky's playmate had been a challenge, and after meeting a number of dogs, they still hadn't found that perfect fit for their family.
